
CONTENTS So what goes into creating an identity design? Overall a standard identity design comprises of a business card, letterhead, and an envelope. But to help let's go over some standard and non-standard specifications.

BUSINESS CARD Often times a business card is the first point of contact that a person will have with an identity design. Business cards can come in a variety of shapes, styles, and even materials.

The standard practice in the past was for business cards to be 3.5" x 2" (by the way it is an industry standard to always refer to size by the width first than the height).

Keep in mind that the content of a business card should include: The Name of the Business Name of the Individual Title of Individual Address Website Phone Number Cell Number (optional) Email Other optional items maybe: Twitter handle


Now this size was largely determined by the fact that many people used an item known as a Rolodex to store their collected business cards so most cards need to follow this size convention.




Since very few people use this contraption anymore we have started seeing a proliferation in non-standard business cards that bring a level of creativity to what many saw as a very mundane item.

It is safest to stay within a 8.5" x 11" or A sizes. A sizes are the standard paper sizes used by countries that measure using the metric system rather than the English System of Measurements that we use in America.

Envelope

Finally we have the envelope which can be a bit harder to get creative with since their are a lot of things we can't do to something that must pass through the mail.

A standard business envelope is a Number 10 which measures at 9.5" x 4.125".

Keep in mind that the content of an envelope is usually for the business as a whole and not for an individual:

> The Name of the Business Address

There are also particular sizing restrictions put on envelop design by the USPS.
